My record on addressing issues regarding clean and renewable energy is clear. When I was governor in 2007, I signed a series of executive orders aimed at reducing greenhouse emissions and setting ambitious goals for renewable fuels for electric utilities. Unfortunately, the state abandoned those goals and now does not have any targets for reducing emissions, conserving electric power or converting to renewable energy. In Congress, I helped introduce a major climate bill, the Energy Innovation & Carbon Dividend Act, that aimed for a 40 percent reduction in carbon emissions in 12 years and a 90 percent reduction by 2050. I support the significant investment in fighting climate change and accelerating the transition to clean energy in the Inflation Reduction Act.

Florida is ground zero for climate change and the impacts of rising sea levels, increasingly destructive storms and warmer temperatures. When I am governor, I will again insist on ambitious goals to reduce carbon emissions and convert to renewable, clean energy. I will work to build a green economy that creates jobs and focuses on new technologies and strategies aimed at addressing climate change. I will insist the Legislature allocate our investments in fighting climate change based on science and that we prioritize communities that have legacy impacts through decades of neglect -- and I will veto spending that does not meet those requirements. Unlike Gov. DeSantis, who vetoed a \$75 million facility at the University of South Florida in St. Petersburg that would house the Interdisciplinary Center of Excellence in Environmental and Oceanographic Sciences, I will invest in research and technology aimed at making Florida more sustainable and resilient. Unlike Gov. DeSantis, I will empower local communities to adopt sustainable, resilient policies and policies aimed at discouraging the use of fossil fuels and encouraging the use of clean energy. I will also lead an effort to add 1 million solar roofs in Florida and have a program that will enable every property owner to benefit from clean energy. Climate change is not just an existential threat. It's an opportunity. These policies will create millions of good-paying jobs, lower energy costs, clean the air and water, and make America energy independent and energy secure.

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
